Report from 07 the Office

Global considerations have hampered or changed ways we have done things. Volunteering, however, remains crucial in New Zealand now as at any other time and in 2021 volunteer-engaging organisations supported by Volunteering Canterbury contributed some \$11.9m (based on minimum wage of \$20/hour) to this region's economy through the gifting of 598,400 hours, impacting on the lives of

303,000 Cantabrians. A 'ripple effect' – where there is a flow-on to those around the individual initially impacted – suggests that these figures are on the light side.

Our Tautoko Network sessions have been somewhat sparse as we have worked around the effects of short-staffing within the sector as a result of COVID-related household self-isolation or illness, and the general fatigue that so many have, or are still, experiencing. Well received events have included Tautoko Network sessions on funding and health and safety in the Covid environment,

and workshops on diversity in the workplace and difficult conversations. Sitting alongside these sessions, our second offering, supported by Rata Foundation, of the Governance Bites series has been less well populated than the first. However those attending talk highly of its benefit and the 'value add' for their organisations. We are confident that these numbers are a reflection more related to the COVID environment we are all navigating than the sessions per se and will be pursuing working alongside Rata and LEAD to offer this series again in 2023. Governance Bites is offered to the wider community sector and the diversity and numbers of different organisations attending session/s indicate that its 'capacity building' goal is being met.

In the year since our last report, 16 new member organisations have joined Volunteering Canterbury, and their diversity is reflected in an added richness to the volunteer roles which we are able to offer to those looking to make a difference in their communities by gifting of their time.

Although low numbers on campuses around New Zealand as the predicted COVID Omicron variant made itself felt created additional 'plan B' planning, our annual partnership with the University of Canterbury to host an on-campus Student Volunteer Expo went ahead and was once again a success – 350 students visited the 26 community organisations in the Undercroft of the University of Canterbury, all of whom went home with a list of potential volunteers to follow-up.

While some of the 'big number' community events we normally participate in or host did not go ahead this year due to COVIDrelated Alert Level requirements around gatherings, we still have managed to be out and about in the community – making 14 presentations to approximately 250 people, with an additional online workshop which attracted 40 participants. Predictably our group volunteering programme has also been impacted, with 27 projects enabling 430 people to get out into the community to 'make a difference'. A new offering, a three hour 'Effective Governance' workshop, received excellent positive feedback from its first cohort, and we hope to build this work up in the coming year.

We thoroughly enjoyed our time with the students and others exhibiting there who are all doing the most amazing work in the community and beyond.

Our social media strategy to highlight the work of individual member organisations and celebrate volunteers has also gone from strength to strength, with 18 organisations being profiled in the past twelve months. Last year we indicated we would be exploring extending this type of coverage to occasions such as Student Volunteer Week and we were delighted with the response when we did just that earlier this year, profiling some amazing young people! The system for identifying people to approach is now more streamlined and the formula developed is working.

While this fixed term contract comes to a close soon, the activity and engagement that has been happening as a result of this appointment gives us great confidence for ongoing support from SDC which will sit alongside a successful bid for COGS funding specific to this area.

COVID created an opportunity for collaboration with colleagues at MSD, CDHB, CDEM, Age Concern and the Cancer Society as we met to plan a response for what was at that time a predicted community outbreak of the COVID-19 Omicron variant. Our ability to step up swiftly, set parameters around volunteers and volunteering, access reliable, task-competent volunteers and – no surprises to us – the impact that those volunteers made during that outbreak, has cemented Volunteering Canterbury's relationship with this group (which continues to meet monthly).

As introduced last year, a strengthened Volunteer Centre Network Aotearoa (VCNA) has provided resources and discussion spaces throughout the year with our team playing an active role in working groups which relate to work within our region. find processes and procedures that can be put in place in preparatioin rather than created 'on the hoof', members of the Volunteering Canterbury team will shortly participate in training around management of spontaneous volunteers with colleagues from Volunteer Centres around the country.

Looking forward to the coming year, the staff team will be prioritising in areas such as accessibility of our services (which may include a necessary review of current tools including the

volunteer recruitment platform and website), inclusiveness, and sustainability. We are excited by the possibilities offered through utilising software recently made available to us by SG360 with which we hope to track and report on things such as the impact a specific volunteer role makes towards a United Nations Sustainable Development Goal (UNSDG). We hope to utilise this information to support member organisations to reassure volunteers of the very real and worthwhile nature of their contribution – no matter its size – and, at the same time, align our work more closely with the Living Standards Framework / Wellbeing Budget, enabling everyone, including our funders, to clearly see the power of volunteering supported by Volunteering Canterbury throughout our region.

Recruit - Individuals

We encourage individuals to apply for volunteering roles posted by our member not-for-profit organisations, across all areas of the community. These volunteers support those who need it most in many different ways: helping vulnerable people, educating and mentoring, supporting charities administratively, counselling and befriending, to name a few.



Recruit - Groups

We arrange groups of people from businesses, schools, faith-based groups and other organisations, to volunteer together, helping not-forprofit organisations achieve larger scale projects.

Promote
