Delivering on Our Mission

Activities and Highlights from the Year in Review

This year has been another dynamic one with continued growth in support for our member organisations with around 450 participants at over 49 events, specifically aimed at providing information and professional development opportunities for volunteer leaders. Member organisation numbers have remained steady, averaging 262 across the year, and together supporting over 383,000 Cantabrians through the gifting of some 1.2m hours.

Our Group Volunteering Programme facilitated opportunities for over 1700 people to participate across 142 one-off community projects. While the groups involved were largely from local businesses, there continues to be solid support from those working with young people across primary, secondary and tertiary institutions. We are grateful to the community organisations which host these groups and ensure a worthwhile volunteer experience for the visiting teams.

Gaining skills which may be transferrable to the workplace continues to be a strong motivator for many of those utilising our recruitment platform. Information gathered through this service also informs operational opportunities. One example of this came about from noting that those interested in finding a volunteer opportunity identified as

belonging to over 20 different ethnicities. The result was a collaboration with the Multicultural and Recreational Community Centre in hosting a 'Newcomers Volunteer Expo'. Such Expos, targeting specific audiences, are valuable recruitment opportunities for our member organisations. The Newcomers Expo and another, which supported those interested in environment roles (hosted at the Richmond Community Gardens), sit alongside our existing partnership with University of Canterbury where we annually host two student-focused expos.

Another highlight was a specific shout out to environment volunteers achieved through the acquiring of a 'Living Wall' at the Climate Action Campus (former Avonside Girls' High School site). Working alongside local artist, Josh Montgomery, the wall was prepared for painting and completed by several local Members of Parliament and City Councillors who responded positively to the invitation to participate.

Social media platforms continue to play a large part in sharing volunteer stories. We moved to ensure these stories are not lost with the creation of a Volunteering Canterbury Collection in the Canterbury Stories archive hosted by the Christchurch City Council Library service.

Our 'Knit for Purpose' micro-vounteering project continued for another year, and once more people knitted at work, home and in libraries and residential facilities to produce beautiful peggy squares made from gifted wool. These were then transformed into a total of 34 blankets, and donated to community organisations across Waitaha.

Advocacy for volunteering is a key part of our role at Volunteering Canterbury. This year we have made submissions to both the 'Amendment to the Social Security Act' in regards to proposals for community work experience and associated financial and non-financial sanctions for beneficiaries, and the 'Emergency Management Bill' which seeks to introduce legislative reforms to ensure a whole-of-society approach to emergency management.

Volcan played a huge role in my journey, from my first volunteer experience to securing long-term employment. I'm incredibly grateful for the support they've given me along the way.

As well as our continued commitment to the Volunteer Centre Network Aotearoa, we were fortunate to support the 2024 Volunteering New Zealand Changemakers Hui held in Ōtautahi, an opportunity for local volunteer managers to immerse themselves in a day of learning and sharing with others from around the country. We were also delighted to identify 20 local volunteer leaders to attend the Hui at no charge, thanks to funding made available by Rātā Foundation.

27th IAVE World Conference, Oct 2024

Our attendance at the 27th IAVE (International Association for Volunteer Effort) World Conference in Pusan, South Korea, presented opportunities for us to share and learn about global volunteering trends and initiatives. This provided insight into what is happening in other regions of the world and also offered timely reminders of the uniqueness of volunteering across Aotearoa, where a

relatively small population makes a huge impact, with an estimated contribution (based on the minimum wage of \$23.15 per hour) of some \$4 billion nationally (of which nearly \$30 million takes place here in Waitaha).

Recognition of volunteers continues to be a huge event for the Volunteering Canterbury team particularly during National Volunteer Week in June. This year, with the presentation of 52 awards, we acknowledged that sadly we had outgrown the amazing facility which we have utilised for many years at the Civic Offices and a new site will be identified for the 2025 Awards event.

With extensive networks across the community, we continue to be well placed to collaborate with diverse groups to ensure support for the community. One example of this has seen the development of a relationship with Civil Defence Emergency Management teams across the region, with a focus on support for management of spontaneous volunteers during emergencies. Another example was a collaboration with local IT company, Inde Technology, to support upskilling of community organisations around data protection and bank scams. We are looking forward to both collaboration opportunities being further developed over the coming year.

"My name is Oliver, and I am 11 years old. Our class at school needed to carry out Ambassador completing some community service tasks. So far this year I have collected money for Child Cancer - knowing that the money has gone to people even younger than me gives me mixed emotions. did some weeding at Silverstream Reserve [and] I have done jobs to save up money to buy grocery items to donate to a food bank. Giving back across our city is making me learn about others and their needs. These experiences are helping me grow mγ confidence. They've made me feel very lucky that I am well and healthy. Age can be a barrier, but I am still finding small ways I can help, even though I'm young."



Deborah

"In 2014 I suffered from hypoxia (lack of oxygen to the brain) and since then have had some difficulty communicating. My daughter got me into volunteering at the Cats Protection League where I still volunteer now. I later started doing Meals on Wheels once a fortnight. I enjoy this as it gets me out of the house. And this year I started volunteering at Kairos Food Rescue. I enjoy this as I get to talk to other volunteers along with keeping my brain active. I love cats and I love people, that is why I am now a volunteer. But it doesn't have to be because you have a brain injury to become a volunteer. It takes all sorts of people become to volunteer."

Recruit - Individuals

We enable individuals to apply for volunteering roles posted by our member not-for-profit organisations, across all areas of the community. These volunteers support those who need it most in many different ways: helping vulnerable people, educating and mentoring, supporting charities administratively, counselling and befriending, to name a few.



Recruit - Groups

We arrange groups of people from businesses, schools, faith-based groups, clubs and other organisations, to volunteer together, utilising their interests and values in a voluntary capacity, and helping not-for-profit organisations achieve larger scale projects.



Support

We support our member organisations by organising relevant workshops, training and networking opportunities, as well as individual meetings to support our members' management of volunteers and related issues.



Promote

We present the benefits of volunteering to schools, businesses and the general public, and share volunteer stories via traditional and social media. We host annual Volunteer Recognition Awards, Volunteer Expos, and special events to celebrate National Volunteer Week, International Volunteer Manager's Day and International Volunteer Day.



Collaborate

In order to increase the scope of volunteering in Canterbury, we actively collaborate with various non-member partners, including the Volunteer Centre Network Aotearoa (VCNA), University of Canterbury, including its PACE (Professional and Community Engagement) team, and Volunteering New Zealand. We encourage inclusiveness within volunteering and are actively trying to reach everyone in our communities.
