As we reflect on the past year, I am both proud and humbled by the accomplishments and resilience demonstrated by our team, volunteers, and community. This past year has been marked by significant achievements, from expanding our community outreach programs to launching innovative volunteer initiatives across our region.



My personal highlights over this past year include:

- Celebrating Volunteering Canterbury's 35th anniversary 1988-2023;
- Presenting a record 38 Awards at our Volunteer Recognition Awards; the gratitude of the Awardees, being acknowledged for volunteering they don't seek recognition for, is what makes this event so special to be a part of;

Office 07 Report 07

The year under review has seen a 'settling' after the tumultuous years resulting from the global pandemic and, despite a constrained economic environment, people have remained generous with their gifting of mahi aroha to community organisations across Waitaha Canterbury. Membership bv community organisations has sat within the range of 267 – 272 through the year (compared to 260-268 in the previous year)

Our 2023 Volunteer Survey found that 10% of those who volunteered noted a motivation of improving employment opportunities, as a tangible benefit from volunteering. The benefits of volunteering to volunteers themselves continues to be a story which needs to be told better; results from the survey confirmed that volunteering enables 'The Five Ways of Wellbeing' - a real benefit to the individual as well as the community with 'making a difference' by giving back continuing to be the number one reason to volunteer.

Across the year, 4257 referrals were made to over 450 roles utilising the volunteer recruitment platform integrated into the Volunteering Canterbury website. Those referrals were requested by a wide crosssection of the community, with 788 from those in the age group 20-29 years, and over 550 identifying as 'students'. With research

suggesting those who volunteer early in life will continue to volunteer throughout their life, these figures bode well for volunteering into the future.

Highlighting that 'people like you volunteer' by sharing volunteers stories continues to be an important waka for engaging the wider community. We utilised Social Media to share 15 volunteer stories across the year and seven 'Volunteer of the Month' posts, a new initiative supported by nominations from community organisations. Additionally, monthly shout-outs have begun to business, faith-based, sports, youth and special interest groups who together contributed 3,500 hours of mahi aroha during the year via our Group Volunteering Programme.

Within our region, we attended 15 community events/expos during the year, and made 29 presentations to nearly 800 people. The Tautoko Network: Supporting the Community Sector and the Governance Bites series (supported by The Rata Foundation) attracted over 220 participants who support their organisations in either governance or volunteer management roles.

A particular highlight during the year under review was the successful 'Knit for Purpose' campaign which was launched on Micro Volunteering Day in April and ran through until World Wide Knit in Public Day in June. Collaborating with the Volunteering Mid-South Canterbury team, people were invited to contribute to knitting peggy squares, whether through providing materials, knitting

or sewing the completed squares into blankets. In Otautahi Christchurch, people knitted at home or got together in schools, libraries, prisons and workplaces to contribute to this project, which resulted in the handing over to community groups of 14 handknitted blankets for passing on to their clients.

Another highlight was the opportunity to work alongside an amazing group of young people studying at NZ Broadcasting School. In a period of six weeks the students put together a remarkable range of collateral (including 16 short videos which can be viewed on You Tube) in a campaign entitled 'Make Your Mahi Have Meaning' which was launched to mark Volunteering Canterbury's 35th anniversary. This material has been well-received, a delight to share and completely met the project brief: to celebrate the diversity of volunteering happening across Waitaha Canterbury every day.

Another busy year has drawn to a close in Selwyn, with many activities and events taking place. Our drop in sessions at Selwyn Libraries continue to be popular, with Te Ara Ātea and Lincoln Libraries having the highest attendance rates over the 12 months.

In June we recognised The Big Shout Out with a special volunteer appreciation event, where Selwyn District Council Mayor, Sam

Broughton, spoke on the importance of volunteering in our community. A catered supper then provided the opportunity for many community groups and organisations in the district to socialise and continue strengthening their connections. It was also encouraging to see a number of Selwyn nominations for our Volunteer Recognition Awards, held during National Volunteer Week in June, acknowledging and celebrating a wide range of volunteers.

Knit for Purpose was a popular project in Selwyn, with a local retirement village leading the charge, creating many squares, which were then sewn together at a group event in June. The new Selwyn Primary Birthing Unit "Oromairaki" was the beneficiary of the blankets made within the Selwyn district. It was wonderful to see the William Pike Challenge students, and local high school students also contributing enthusiastically to this project.

Embracing new beginnings in the Selwyn District, we held our first ever Newcomer's Volunteer Expo, with twenty local not-forprofit organisations in attendance. The focus was on showcasing the ways in which volunteering can help newcomers to meet people, make connections and gain valuable skills to help them settle in. Approximately 80 joined us to talk newcomers with organisations and take up local volunteering opportunities.

In support of volunteering in the wider Selwyn District we attended a number of locally-run events alongside other local community organisations. "I've been a Volunteer Fire Fighter for over 10 years. Initially, I joined because I had moved into the Rolleston area and being a shift worker gave me the opportunity to help the brigade and community during my down time. As a Senior Fire Fighter, my role is no different to any other SFF in NZ's volunteer brigades. The community expects us to be trained and ready to respond. We have a great team at Rolleston VFB.

Not every incident ends with a happy result, or a feeling of pride, but there is a small few that do. Whilst it is never a mother's choice to have a fire truck arrive while she is in the middle of a premature delivery, being able to assist 3 babies (not my own) make their way into the world are comfortably my proudest moments."

"I began volunteering at Pregnancy Choice when I came back to NZ after being abroad. Friends of mine were involved and put the word out that help was needed, so L jumped on board! Pregnancy Choice supports those facing unplanned is pregnancy, and SO important to me - I see it as a great benefit to the local community, allowing women a safe space to wrestle with big life decisions. We hope to make it easier to parent in a culture which makes it increasingly hard. I love being at pregnancy choice, seeing women encouraged and excited about motherhood, and I love being able to be the one to encourage and enable them!"

"I have been volunteering with Hagley Adult Literacy Centre for 2 years. The main reason I started volunteering was I want to work in New Zealand. I am a helper in ESOL community classes. What I do is helping the learners to study English in the class, and making sure that both tutor and learners can understand with each other. I would say to someone else considering volunteering, while there is no income, you may earn everything you want, particularly in the people experience and skills."

Recruit - Individuals

We encourage individuals to apply for volunteering roles posted by our member not-for-profit organisations, across all areas of the community. These volunteers support those who need it most in many different ways: helping vulnerable people, educating and mentoring, supporting charities administratively, counselling and befriending, to name a few.



Recruit - Groups

We arrange groups of people from businesses, schools, faith-based groups, clubs and other organisations, to volunteer together, helping not-for-profit organisations achieve larger scale projects.



Support

We support our member organisations by organising relevant workshops, training and network opportunities, as well as individual meetings to support our members' management of volunteers and related issues.





Promote

We present the benefits of volunteering to schools, businesses and the general public, and share volunteer stories via traditional and social media. We host annual Volunteer Recognition Awards, Student Volunteer Expos, and events to celebrate International Volunteer Week, International Volunteer Manager's Day and International Volunteer Day.

Collaborate

In order to increase the scope of volunteering in Canterbury, we actively collaborate with various non-member partners, including the Volunteer Centre Network Aotearoa (VCNA), University of Canterbury, including its PACE (Professional and Community Engagement) team, and Volunteering New Zealand. We encourage inclusiveness within volunteering and are actively trying to reach everyone in our communities.
